Modern Martyrs: St Oscar Romero

Born: 15th August 1917 Died: 24th March 1980 Occupation: Priest

Biography

He was born in El Salvador, Central America. When he was 13, he decided he wanted to be a priest.

After being made a priest (ordained) in 1942, he rose from being a priest to Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977. At the time, San Salvador was a dangerous place to live. The country was run by a government who allowed violence to happen with no consequences.

St Oscar Romero spent time helping people who were poor and punished for their beliefs. His church began to make a record of when the government were abusing human rights. He was shot dead while celebrating mass, also called Holy Communion or the Eucharist. He was made a saint (canonised) in 2018.
